


Presentation Topic

Egg-Laying Lizard Dogs and the Amazing Early History of Mammals

Greg will discuss the amazing evolutionary history of mammals, using fossils to trace their ancestry deep into the Paleozoic, over 300 million years ago. We'll examine what traits separate mammals from reptiles, when and why these traits evolved, how the intermediate steps

(therapsids or "lizard dogs") looked and behaved, and whether the great radiation of mammals that ultimately produced the human species was triggered by the end-

Cretaceous extinction of dinosaurs.

Fossil vendor support of the December FCOLC Fossil Show

He has collected more skulls in one trip than most fossil hunters will discover in a lifetime. Frank has several fossils named for him, from both the Phosphate mines of Central Florida, to the digs at Leisey, to the fossil beds out west.

Summertime fossil hunting in Jax

Summer rains bring an end to the Peace River fossil season and those of us who have spent a good part of the last several months digging there have been feeling a bit lost. I sent out a query through the Fossil Forum (http://www.thefossilforum.com) looking for summer fossil hunting locations north of Orlando. Fossil hunters can be very tight-lipped about good digging sites so I was happily surprised when someone responded with a couple of spots in Jacksonville.

I loaded up my truck and hit the road by 4:30 am in an attempt to avoid the worst of the heat. Silly me! I arrived at my first destination, Quarantine Island in the St. John's River, shortly before 7 am and the heat was already a killer. It was a quick paddle over from the parking area under Dames Point Bridge but the island is as big as a small city, desolate and full of trash, heavy brush, and snakes. I'm not afraid of any of those things IF I have the proper gear. I did not. Brush pants, sturdy boots, and a can of industrial strength DEET are musts, as well as a raised sifting screen (easily constructed by attaching a river screen to the top of a walker purchased at a thrift store). What I had was plenty of water, sunscreen, and an obsessive need to find fossils so I did some surface hunting in a large gravel covered area directly across from my launch point. Considering that I only spent about an hour looking, the results were promising, the best being a Mako (1 and 3/8" long) with some root damage but a beautiful pearlescent color to the blade. Who knows what a full day's digging in cooler weather could turn up?



My other stop was Ponte Verde Beach. The Fossil Forum contact had given very specific instructions regarding this area as it's a neighborhood of high dollar homes and they don't want my 1995 Ford Ranger parked in their front yard. I don't really like it parked in my front yard, either, but that's another story. I parked where instructed, an easy quarter mile walk from the beach, and got to the waterline at the start of the ebb tide.

I've done my time beach combing and I don't really like to do it anymore. I was walking along the sand, men-

I was walking along the sand, mentally poo-pooing it as a waste of time, when I saw the unmistakable shape of a shark tooth root protruding from the crushed shell at the tide line. I almost couldn't believe it as I picked up a tooth from a great white shark! I've never found such a big tooth on a beach before and I've never found a tooth from a great white shark before! Measuring 1.5", it has good serrations and a worn but complete root.

So I've done a mild revision of my opinion regarding beach combing and I am sending happy thankful thoughts (and emails) to everyone who's been generous with their fossiling information and I will continue to seek summer fossil sites north of I-4, but mostly, I want this rain to stop so I can get back to the Peace River!

Better Lucky Than Good


In the winter of 2008 while hunting with Louis and Leslie Stieffel I had the best day of fossil hunting in my life. I have yet to outdo my experience of that special, special day.

We were hunting the Peace River north of Arcadia in about 2 feet of water. After several hours of uneventful hunting I began to complain that while I was finding. things I just wasn't doing well. Louis invited me over to the opposite bank near where he was hunting and suggested I get up tight to the bank as it probably had not been hunted before. I did so and after about an hour of clearing debris things began to emerge. Finally a perfect blue colored mastodon tooth sat on my shovel. This was my first complete mastodon tooth and still is my only complete mastodon tooth. After several more hours of digging I had two additional pieces which, when put together, made up two thirds of an un-erupted mastodon tooth. Before the day was out I also found a complete perfect mammoth tooth as well as enough keeper fossils to fill a 5 gallon bucket.



I returned the following Friday only to find out that another club beat me back to the spot and <u>mined</u> it out. This is relatively common occurrence because experienced fossil hunters are attracted to recent digging spots. That's why I don't divulge my honey holes when I find one. If Louis had not suggested I move to that spot I would have never found these treasures. So you can see why I say I'd rather be lucky than good.

FCOLC Fossil of the Month - September, 2013



Fossil: Lightning strike Isurus Hastalus upper tooth, 2 inches, Miocene minimally 5 mya.

Date found: July 10th 2013.

Location: small creek in Clearwater, in Pinellas County.

How it was found: I was walking in ankle deep water, looking for a new place to dig. I found an area where we haven't dug yet. I started scanning the area when a shiny object caught my eye. At first I thought it was a leaf, but my instinct told me it wasn't. I reached down, and picked it up, and it was a 2 inch make. The creeks in this area don't have many fossils, but they are rare and decent. My father, my friend, and I started screaming over the best tooth of the trip.

<u>How it measures up to my other makos</u>: This is the biggest Isurus Hastalus I have in my collection to date, as well as the most colorful. I have found many makos before, but it was nice to find the extinct Hastalus.
