FCOLC presentation for November meeting!!

EARLY CRETACEOUS TO PALEOCENE PALEOGEOGRAPHY OF THE WESTERN INTERIOR SEAWAY: THE INTERACTION OF EUSTASY, TECTONISM, AND SEDIMENTATION

Joshua Slattery was born and raised in Cheyenne, Wyoming and received a BS in Geology and a minor in Zoology from the University of Wyoming. He became interested in geology and paleontology during high school when he began to actively collect fossils in southeastern Wyoming and northern Colorado. During his time in college, he developed a passion for investigating the paleontology of Late Cretaceous macroinvertebrate faunas. After graduating from college, he spent one year working for Uinta Paleontological Associates, Inc. of Vernal, Utah, as a geologist monitoring sites (e.g., gas and petroleum pipelines, coal mines) in Wyoming and Colorado for paleontological resources endangered by energy development.

Joshua's interest eventually led him to the University of South Florida (USF) in Tampa to work on questions related to the paleontology of Mesozoic and Cenozoic marine

invertebrate faunas for his graduate research. He is currently a Ph.D. candidate at the USF working on an NSF-funded project examining the influence ice- and greenhouse climatic modes have on evolutionary patterns. In addition to this research, he is also interested in stratigraphic paleobiology, paleogeography, ammonites, and the paleontology of the Western Interior Seaway as well as the Gulf of Mexico. In addition to these interests, he has also partaken in geological and paleontological field work in Wyoming, Colorado, Utah, Montana, South Dakota, Nebraska, New Mexico, Minnesota, Kansas, Texas, Alabama, Mississippi, Tennessee, Florida, Denmark, and Colombia.



FIELD TRIP!!!

A fossil collecting trip is scheduled for Saturday, December 1st!!! This will be at the **Ft Drum** Crystal mine, otherwise also known as Ruck's Pit. It is north of Lake Oceechobee several miles, and is a nice ride out in the country! Cost of \$60 per person has been reduced for the club to \$50 per person. Start time is 9am. But you can show up, and leave, whenever you want—after 9am.

Directions will be given to those who may need them.

The targeted fossil will be the Mercenaria clams filled with dog-toothed calcite crystals. Very beautiful, and valuable if you find a good one!, these are prized by collectors throughout the world. **Ft Drum** is the only place where these have been collected in any appreciable quantities. Anyone with determination and desire can find these. It's a bit of work, digging, scraping and washing the piles but the rewards can well be worth the efforts.

This is a fairly primitive site. There is bathroom facilities, but not much else. Bring your own food and drink, and wear clothes and shoes that can get muddy and possibly wet. Bring a potato rake or equivalent to scrape the piles. Bring your camera. This is in the boonies, so cell phone reception may be spotty. And, please do not try riding the cows.

Peace River Water Levels









We had also offered to pay a small fee of \$10.00-\$15.00 per person to help offset the cost of the two employees who acted as guides.






